2022 Record Keeping Training & Hot Topics Common Errors Found in Medical Records

Illegible handwritten entries:

- Difficult and confusing to follow your treatment plan
- Increasing the risk of medical errors

Client acknowledgment:

- Not having signed or documented estimates for procedures
- Not documenting services declined
- Not documenting medications declined
- Failing to provide discharge instructions in writing
- Failing to confirm that consent forms have been signed by the client

Common Errors Found in Medical Records cont.

Pre-surgical Exam Not Documented:

A pre-surgical assessment must be done within 12 hours prior to the administration of an anesthetic, and the results of this examination shall be noted in the patient's medical record.

- Pre-surgical assessment
- The person performing pre-surgical assessment
- Detailed anesthesia report

Surgical Notes Not Documented:

- Sedation drugs
- Surgical notes
- Suture type notes
- Medication
- Post-surgical monitoring
- Post care instructions
- Detailed surgical report



Additional Errors Found in Medical Records

Physical exams not entered

Immunization records not entered

Prior medical history not entered



Anesthesia Monitoring

- Shall be monitored while the patient is under general anesthesia.
 - Monitored continuously
 - Recorded at least every 15 minutes
- Shall not be released from veterinary supervision until it is **responsive and recovered from anesthesia**.
 - Fully Awake
 - Ambulatory (if ambulatory before surgery)
 - Maintain Body Temperature
 - Able to Swallow
- If the client demands to take the animal home against the veterinarian's advice and judgement:
 - The client should sign a release form stating:
 - The client has been advised not to leave with the animal
 - The client realizes the risks involved
 - The client is taking the animal against the advice of the veterinarian



Release of Medical Records

The Board may discipline a licensee failing to follow this law. Disclosure of records are prohibited unless the client has provided written or documented verbal consent.

 Unless by court order, subpoena, or compliance with law to protect the animal or public health.

A veterinarian shall provide a client medical record within 30 days of request.

Medical records must be released to a client even if a bill is owed.

Prescription Requests

Shall honor a client's request for a prescription in lieu of dispensing

- Can charge for writing a prescription
- Cannot refuse a different pharmacy

Telehealth – Effective June 8, 2022

- Personal examination is a face to face, in person, examination
- Occurs where the patient is located
- A veterinarian-client-patient relationship is required
 - Shall perform an in-person exam within the 12 months prior and
 - At least every 12 months thereafter
 - In the event of an imminent, life-threatening emergency:
 - Telehealth services can be performed without an existing VCPR or
 - Without an in-person visit within 12 months.
- The standard of care shall be the same as for in-person care.



Telehealth Continued

Must ensure that the client is aware of:

• The veterinarian's identity, location, license number, and licensure status

Provide to the client a clear mechanism to:

- Access, supplement, and amend client-provided contact information and health information about the patient;
- Register complaints with the Board;
- Provide consent for the use of telemedicine

Patient medical records must meet the same requirements as in person visit

Shall not prescribe any controlled substance listed in Schedule II

Inspections – Frequent Deficiencies

License and facility permits not posted	Abandoned Animal Notice not posted	No isolation room	*Controlled substance register missing required fields	*Label missing required fields
Surgery room not solely used for surgery	Peeling paint in kennels	*DEA Biennial inventory not completed	Radiology health certificate expired	Not using a reverse distributor

Controlled Substance Reverse Distributor

- Must use a DEA Approved Vendor
- The Board has provided a handout for vendors that accept mail in

X-Rays

All radiation equipment used in WV must be registered with the state of WV.

The equipment application registration can be found on our website.

Change of Veterinarian in Charge Upon any change in veterinarian-in-charge, these procedures shall be followed:

Responsible for the establishment and the stock of controlled substances until a new veterinarian-in-charge is registered.

An application for a new permit naming a new veterinarian-in-charge shall be filed as soon as possible but no more than 10 days after the change.

New Owner of a Facility

Notification to the Board

- The new owner shall notify the Board within 5 days of such purchase
- Facility Inspection
- Failure to comply could result in a disciplinary action

Veterinarian in Charge

- DEA initial inventory of all Schedule II-V drugs on-hand.
- They shall date and sign the inventory and maintain it on premises for three years.

Practice is Closing

Clients shall be notified a minimum of 4 weeks prior to closing or moving as to how they may acquire a copy of their animal's medical records.

Records must be made available at convenient times and accessible locations for a period of no less than 1 month. The veterinarian-incharge registered with the Board is responsible for the establishment and the stock of controlled substances.



ANNUAL VETERINARIAN AND RVT CE AUDITS COMPLIANCE – 90%

In February 2022, we conducted a random CE audit of 10% of the Veterinarians and RVTs

8 veterinarians and 2 RVTs were non-compliant which resulted in Board initiated Complaints and Disciplinary Consent Agreements.

Most common non-compliance:

- Not enough scientific, laboratory, regulatory, and medical record keeping
- Not RACE or WV Board approved
- No proof of attendance

CE Audits Frequent Questions

How many hours can be online? Any or all the hours can be done online.

What are the Board approved CE programs? Provided online.

How many CEs are required?

Veterinarians:

18 WV Board approved CE hours in the field of veterinary medicine.

- A minimum of 14 hours related to the practice of veterinary medicine to include scientific, laboratory, regulatory, and medical record keeping.
- No more than 4 hours shall be related to practice management.

Registered Veterinary Technicians:

8 WV Board approved CE hours in the field of veterinary medicine.

- A minimum of 4 hours related to the practice of veterinary medicine to include scientific, laboratory, regulatory, and medical record keeping
- No more than 4 hours shall be related to practice management

Can I get a CE extension? Yes, if it's due to a medical issue, a CE hardship extension can be requested to the Board no later than December 15.

Can hours be carried over? No hours shall be accumulated, carried forward, or held over past the calendar year in which the hours were completed.
